Genesis 25:19-34

¹⁹ These are the generations of Isaac, Abraham's son: Abraham fathered Isaac,²⁰ and Isaac was forty years old when he took Rebekah, the daughter of Bethuel the Aramean of Paddan-aram, the sister of Laban the Aramean, to be his wife.²¹ And Isaac prayed to the LORD for his wife, because she was barren. And the LORD granted his prayer, and Rebekah his wife conceived. ²² The children struggled together within her, and she said, "If it is thus, why is this happening to me?" So she went to enquire of the LORD. ²³ And the LORD said to her,

"Two nations are in your womb,

and two peoples from within you shall be divided; the one shall be stronger than the other, the older shall serve the younger."

²⁴When her days to give birth were completed, behold, there were twins in her womb. ²⁵The first came out red, all his body like a hairy cloak, so they called his name Esau. ²⁶Afterwards his brother came out with his hand holding Esau's heel, so his name was called Jacob. Isaac was sixty years old when she bore them.

²⁷When the boys grew up, Esau was a skilful hunter, a man of the field, while Jacob was a quiet man, dwelling in tents. ²⁸Isaac loved Esau because he ate of his game, but Rebekah loved Jacob.

²⁹Once when Jacob was cooking stew, Esau came in from the field, and he was exhausted. ³⁰ And Esau said to Jacob, "Let me eat some of that red stew, for I am exhausted!" (Therefore his name was called Edom.) ³¹Jacob said, "Sell me your birthright now." ³²Esau said, "I am about to die; of what use is a birthright to me?" ³³Jacob said, "Swear to me now." So he swore to him and sold his birthright to Jacob. ³⁴Then Jacob gave Esau bread and lentil stew, and he ate and drank and rose and went his way. Thus Esau despised his birthright. What is the most precious thing to you?

1) God's promised salvation is humanity's only hope

The look backward: God alone can do it

The look forward: God's grace to the undeserving

2) So dismissing God's promise is all it takes to miss out

Romans 9:10-12 explains how God's decision that "the older will serve the younger" underlines that our salvation is by sheer grace and based on "God's purpose of election." How might this realisation impact our sense of thankfulness and humility?

How might we be in danger of making the same mistake as Esau? What difference does it make knowing that, though Esau regretted his actions, "he found no chance to repent" (Hebrews 12:17)?

Jesus describes how the kingdom of heaven is like finding treasure in a field (Matthew 13:44). Is this your experience? Why or why not?
